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PROFILE: TOM KUNDIG

A Q&A with the Seattle-based architect on materials, his work, and a final resting place



By Land, Sea, and Air

For the Gulf Coast states, the automotive, shipping, and aerospace industries are leading the way out of the recession. BY J. MICHAEL WELTON



MANUFACTURING IN the Gulf Coast states—never completely down during the recession—is making a comeback. Alabama's

secretary of commerce, Greg Canfield, points to auto as one reason, citing Mercedes-Benz's expansion of its "C" class facility and Honda's new Acura plant. As domestic housing trends upward, some building products are benefiting as well. Tuscaloosa-based screen manufacturer Phifer, for one, reports that traditional insect-screen business is up this year.

Mississippi is growing its automotive sector, which was nonexistent until Nissan arrived a decade ago. Employing 5,600 in Canton, it recently broke ground for a partswarehouse facility that could attract suppliers to the area. As for building products, manufacturing is up from last year at Booneville company Heartland Siding.

Florida, which broke its own tourism record last year, is getting into the act, eliminating sales tax on manufacturing equipment in hopes of diversifying, St. Augustine-based wood-panel manufacturer Rulon International reports that business is up, as it was even during the downturn, says Rulon's Jesse Reyes.

In Louisiana, the emphasis has been on oil, gas, and chemicals. South African Sasol is investing \$16 billion near Lake Charles to convert natural gas to liquid, lowsulfur diesel. Bolstered by \$14 billion in capital projects from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, New Orleans is beginning to boom. It has also gained a new \$40 million meat-shipping facility on its waterfront.

Florida is looking to its ports, too (15 in all), investing millions to position itself as a trade hub with South America. The Mobile, Ala., and Gulfport, Miss., ports are also expanding in anticipation of a new era in global shipping.

Aerospace plays a role as well. Northup Grumman plans to add an aircraft design facility in Florida. And Boeing and Lockheed Martin are in New Orleans researching NASA's planned trip to Mars. To summarize: for the Gulf Coast, the skies are no longer the limit.


